A warm welcome back to Samuel Richardson! I would like to thank the residents for all their hard work and pulling together as a team to cover Sam's absence. Thank you to Bonnie Mannino who juggled JFWCC schedules to accommodate Sam's absence and the ever changing coverage schedules. I am so proud to be a part of this Program.

Our program goals and action plan for 2018/2019:

- OR 19 - collect safety data to move cases to the Main OR on Wednesdays.
- Develop a more formal QI/PI curriculum - Team projects to be presented at Grand Rounds on May 28, 2019.
- Provide Quality Metrics data to residents and faculty - to be presented at monthly M&M.
- Increase the timeliness of faculty evaluations completed within 2 weeks from 61.5% to 80% (this is an ACGME requirement).
- Increase the number of minimally invasive hysterectomies from 35 to 70 for each graduating resident (this is the new minimum number required by the ACGME).

- The Gift of Rain by Tan Twan Eng

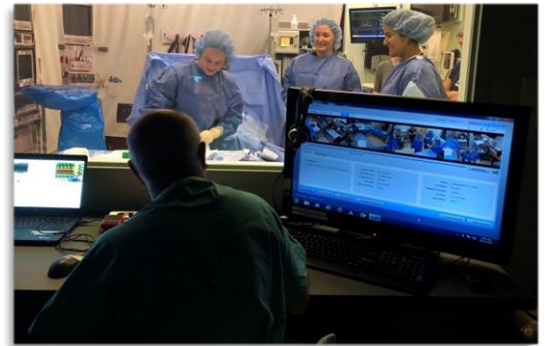
What is your favorite restaurant?

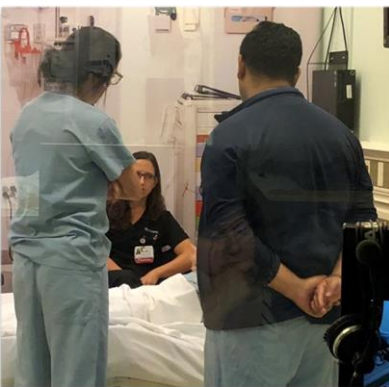
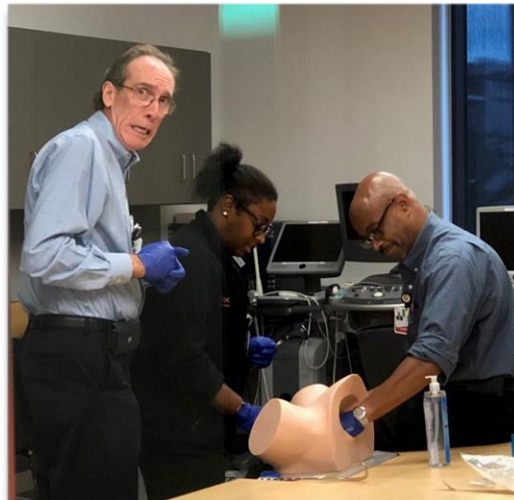
